Want to lend a hand to those suffering from poverty? Make a gracious donation. You can donate food, clothes, blankets, money, or anything that a person living in poverty may need.






What are the causes of homelessness?

- Lack of affordable housing
- Unemployment
- Poverty
- Low wages
- Mental illness and the lack of needed services (Single adult individuals)
- Substance abuse and the lack of needed services (Single adult individuals)



Martin Luther King Jr. Day



President Ronald Reagan signed a bill to establish the holiday in 1983. It eventually passed Congress, and the first observance occurred on January 20, 1986.

Martin Luther King Jr. Day is celebrated with equal importance in the Japanese city of Hiroshima, where a banquet is held at the mayor's office. The holiday is also officially recognized in Toronto, Ontario, although all businesses and government services remain open.

The Dr. Martin Luther King Tribute and Dinner has been held in Wassenaar, The Netherlands since 1986. The event traditionally concludes with crowds singing the Civil Rights Movement anthem "We Shall Overcome."

Martin Luther King Jr. Day (Jan. 16) is a federal holiday in the United States, which honors King as the chief spokesperson for nonviolent activism in the Civil Rights Movement.

The campaign for a federal holiday in King's honor began soon after his assassination in 1968, largely promoted by labor unions. Momentum for the holiday gained support from the corporate community and the general public—greatly strengthened by the release of Stevie Wonder's single "Happy Birthday" in 1980 and his hosting of the Rally for Peace Press Conference in 1981—culminating in a petition to pass the law that received 6 million signatures.
